Classification of the significance of a holiday's observance is based on recommendations from representatives of the group who celebrate it. A balance between any formal religious standard and the actual contemporary observance of the holiday is the intended aim of these recommendations.

No-School Holidays

Our No-School Holidays are days during the academic year when school will be closed if the holiday falls on a school day. These dates are reflected in the school's Academic Calendar.

Event-Free Holidays

Additional holiday observances of major significance to a group are indicated on the online All-School Calendar by "Event-Free Day".

- Tryouts, for example teams or plays
- One-time or major events (festivals, class photos, dances, etc.)
- Class/Parent meetings

Students will likely be with their families or at a place of worship in observance of these holidays. They might not be in school and/or have time available to do the required homework. Absence to observe these holidays will be excused and the student will have make-up privileges for missed work.
